Not only was this austere little stripper built without a radio (for a \$60 savings on the \$2,097 base price), it's also a heater-delete car. Check out the rare factory-issue fan motor and heater hose block-off plates on the firewall. Inside-just under the radio delete plate-the usual underdash heater control unit is completely absent. No, it isn't

product of an especially frugal buyer.

Of particular interest to Mopar lovers are the paintings "Mopar Strip," "Hemi Under Gas," "Moparty," "Moparty Too," and "Brice Road." All these (and more) are reproduced in full color in the 9x12-inch large format book on heavy stock paper.

My Classic Car host Dennis Gage wrote the book's foreword, where he says, "David Snyder's art celebrates that iconic era when





performance was king . . . It's sort of the car enthusiast's version of what they say about the '60s in general; If David Snyder's art doesn't speak to you, then you weren't really there."

Like the prints of his paintings, The Automotive Art of David Snyder is available in a limited edition (of 4,000 books), each one signed and numbered.
